INFORMAL MARKET WORLDS III

Synopsis

Over the past ten years, linkages between the *informal* and *formal* sector have expanded on a global scale both in terms of quantity, and degree of interdependence. Some examples of such linkages include the taxation of the informal sector, the creation of informal jobs by state institutions, and the instrumentalisation of informal market relations. In general terms, these expanding linkages indicate a relational hybridity to market relations identified as either 'informal' or 'formal.' A matter of *definition*, informal markets relay intricate fabrics of networked trade relations and the bringing-together of economic and non-economic events into terrains of ongoing spatial mutation.

Moments of rupture lie at the genesis of informal markets. Often triggered by political upheaval, economic destabilisation, migratory movements and new labour situations, informal markets foster alternative models of governance in contexts where institutional protocols have come to a deadlock, rendering these markets as primary sites of policy intervention. However, the heterogeneous nature of such policy interventions, which range from the closure of informal markets to the appropriation of their entrepreneurial energy, illustrates pronounced differences in policy attitudes towards the informal sector, which extend from the criminalisation of informal economic activities as a seedbed of conflict and violence, to the endorsement of the transformational potential of informal economies.

The working hypothesis of this 2-day research forum, organised in the context of the FWF-funded research project 'Incorporating Informality', postulates that the *spatial* unfolding of these interventions has become a crucial terrain for the negotiation of these competing orientations. Studying the ongoing spatial transformation and corresponding policy interventions at selected informal markets worldwide, the project seeks to gain novel insights into the current tension between competing concepts of economic development and governance, particularly into the emergence of novel forms of formal-informal linkages in these processes. 'Incorporating Informality' follows up on the earlier FWF-funded research project "Other Markets", which investigated how informal marketplaces are embedded in a global matrix of spatio-economic struggles (Informal Market Worlds: The Architecture of Economic Pressure, 2015). Led by Helge Mooshammer and Peter Mörtenböck, co-directors of the Centre for Global Architecture, and in collaboration with an international network of researchers, the research team will conduct in-depth case studies at twelve different sites, including Bangkok's Saphan Lek, Luanda's Roque Santeiro, Buenos Aires' La Salada, and Brčko's Arizona Market.

The findings of these field studies will be documented and analysed through a newly developed multidimensional mapping matrix that classifies four distinct categories and strategies of engagement with informal markets. These categories include: *forced closure, spatial relocation, infrastructural improvement,* and *appropriation* of entrepreneurial undertakings. Using maps, charts, diagrams and texts, this mapping matrix will help generate a basic typology of key spatial policies that are shaping the role of informal markets in contemporary urban development. The findings will be made available through journal articles, extensive monographs, exhibitions, on-site presentations and an online platform, all of which will provide a vital contribution to public debates about emergent forms of hybrid economic governance.
